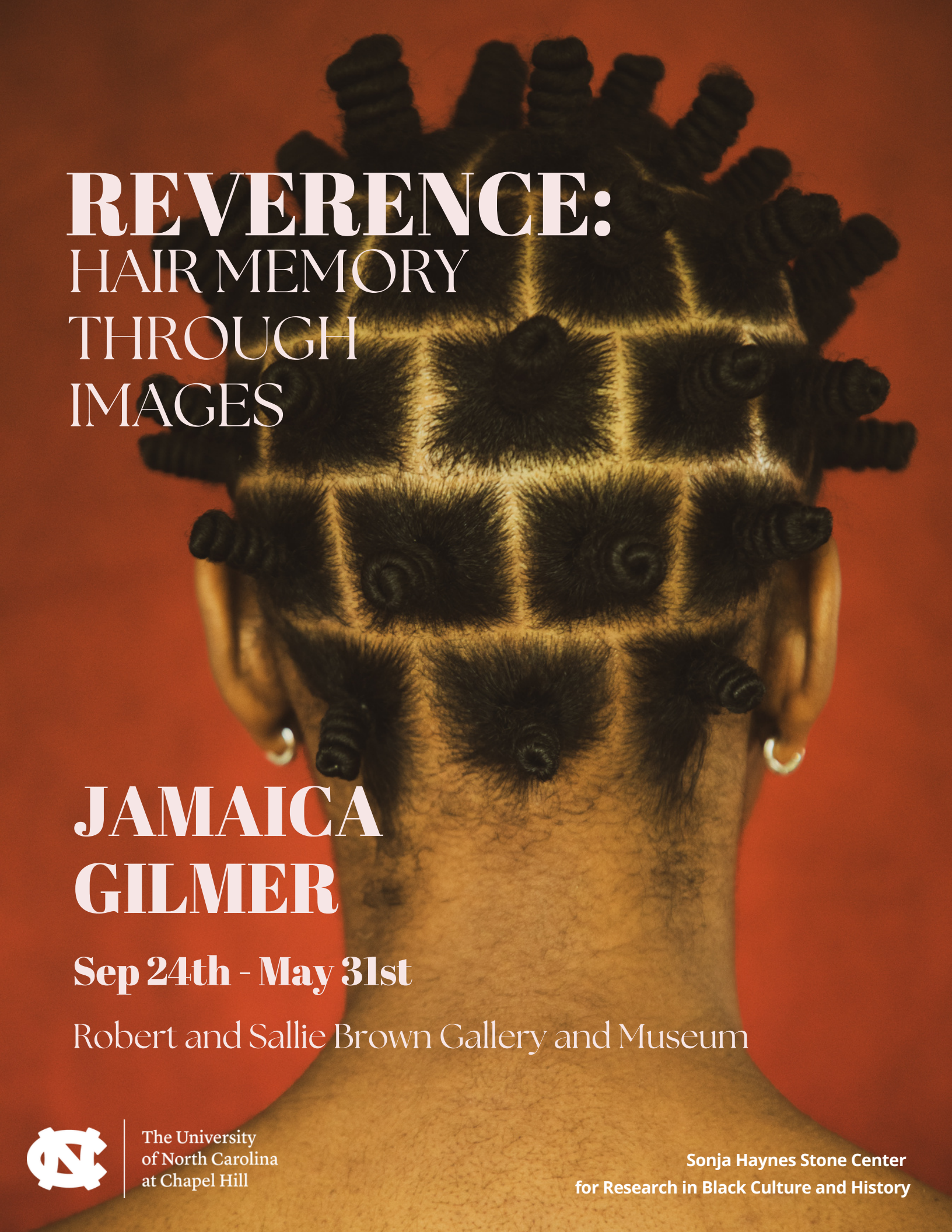

ARTIST

Jamaica Gilmer is a relentless hope-architect, multifaceted artist, and curator working across photography, ceramics, and film. Her most recent series, *We are the Sun: A Photographic Tribute to Black Community*, celebrates the intergenerational wisdom of ThirdSpace Action Lab in Cleveland, Ohio. She is the founder of The Beautiful Project (TBP) and the lead curator of TBP's past exhibition at the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Uris Center for Education, Pen, Lens, and Soul: The Story of The Beautiful Project. Her work is featured in Kleaver Cruz's recent book, *The Black Joy Project: A Literary and Visual Love Letter to How We Thrive*. Jamaica is the recipient of the 2026 Pamela Nicole Cummings Visiting Artist Fellowship at the Sonja Haynes Stone Center for Research in Black Culture and History at UNC-Chapel Hill. At the core of her organizing practice, Jamaica is committed to telling sacred stories of possibility through interdisciplinary making.

Reverence: Hair Memory Through Images by Jamaica Gilmer is a photographic testament to Black hair. ARTIST STATEMENT

JAMAICA GILMER

My art practice is an invitation to witness and imagine power, hope, and joy. In *Reverence*, the images and scale capture the core of my practice, surrounding viewers with life-sized portraits of Black hair that evoke personal reflection and collective memory. *Reverence: Hair Memory Through Images* is a photographic testament to Black hair. Here, stylists and barbers become the hair artists, and the Black people who sit in their chairs become the muse. Comprised of 27 artworks, *Reverence* features a contemplative short film and vibrant large-scale portraits that center our global histories, presented as sacred exhibitions in everyday spaces.

We are currently navigating a volatile political landscape that is systematically targeting the rights and freedoms of Black and Brown people throughout the country. Dr. Jasmine Cobb, author of *New Growth: The Art and Texture of Black Hair*, writes “Black hair has long been a battleground for liberation.” What does it mean to exist as a person whose hair is a daily site for potential tyranny, confinement, or control?

What spaces create daily revolutionary responses to this reality? How do non-Black people co-exist with this subconsciously political expression of power and autonomy with permission? How does our collective memory impact our contemporary experience of Black hair in daily life? Both the content of this exhibit and the accompanying programming allows audiences to interrogate their experience of the past and present through the lens of Black hair.

The truth of Black people’s history and contemporary experience of systemic violence is a universal haunting. In my curatorial practice, I use artwork to give Black people a moment of relief in the midst of it all. The images and reflections bring people back to their own possibilities, their own memories of joy, community, and peace. Delight becomes an invitation extended to every visitor who encounters my work. For this exhibition, I take an interdisciplinary approach that contextualizes the global history of Black hair and who gets to form and witness it. *Reverence* celebrates those we give permission to — and the homes, salons, and barbershops we inhabit.

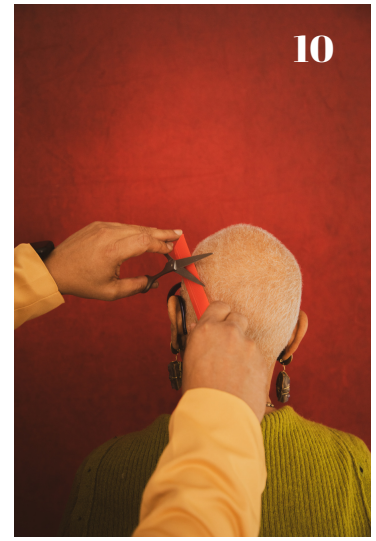

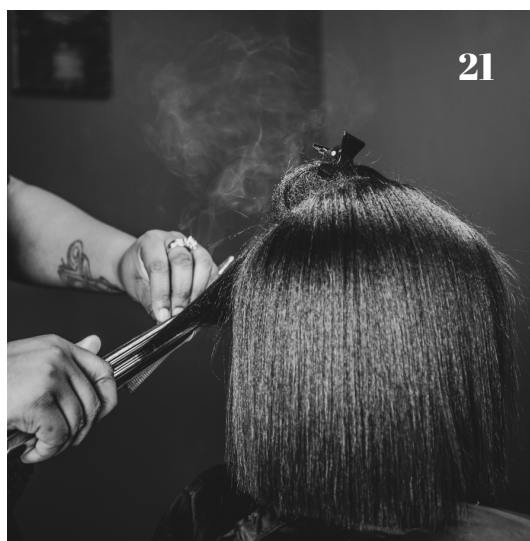
